Since 2005 when it was founded, LGBT+ History Month has been celebrated every year in February. This is a chance to celebrate the history and recognise the rights of LGBTQ+ people.

What Does LGBTQ+ Stand For?

Lesbian: a woman who is attracted to other women.

Gay: a man who is attracted to other men or a woman who is attracted to other women.

Bisexual: a person who is attracted to both men and women.

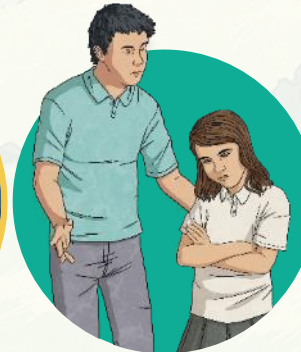
Transgender: describes someone whose gender identity (how they feel) is different from the sex they were registered with at birth.

+ The '+' represents other members of the community who do not feel that they fit into any of these categories.

You might sometimes see LGBTQ+. The Q can stand for queer or questioning. Queer can be a term that some people who don't feel that they identify with any of the other labels use to describe themselves. Questioning is when someone is exploring their sexual orientation or gender identity.

Demonstrations in response to a police raid on a gay club in New York. These riots started the gay rights movement in America and around the world.

A march on the first anniversary of the Stonewall Riots which encouraged individual freedom and celebrated diversity.



1972 First Gay Pride in London

1978 The Debut of the Rainbow Flag

During the San Francisco Gay Pride event, the symbol associated with Pride was established.



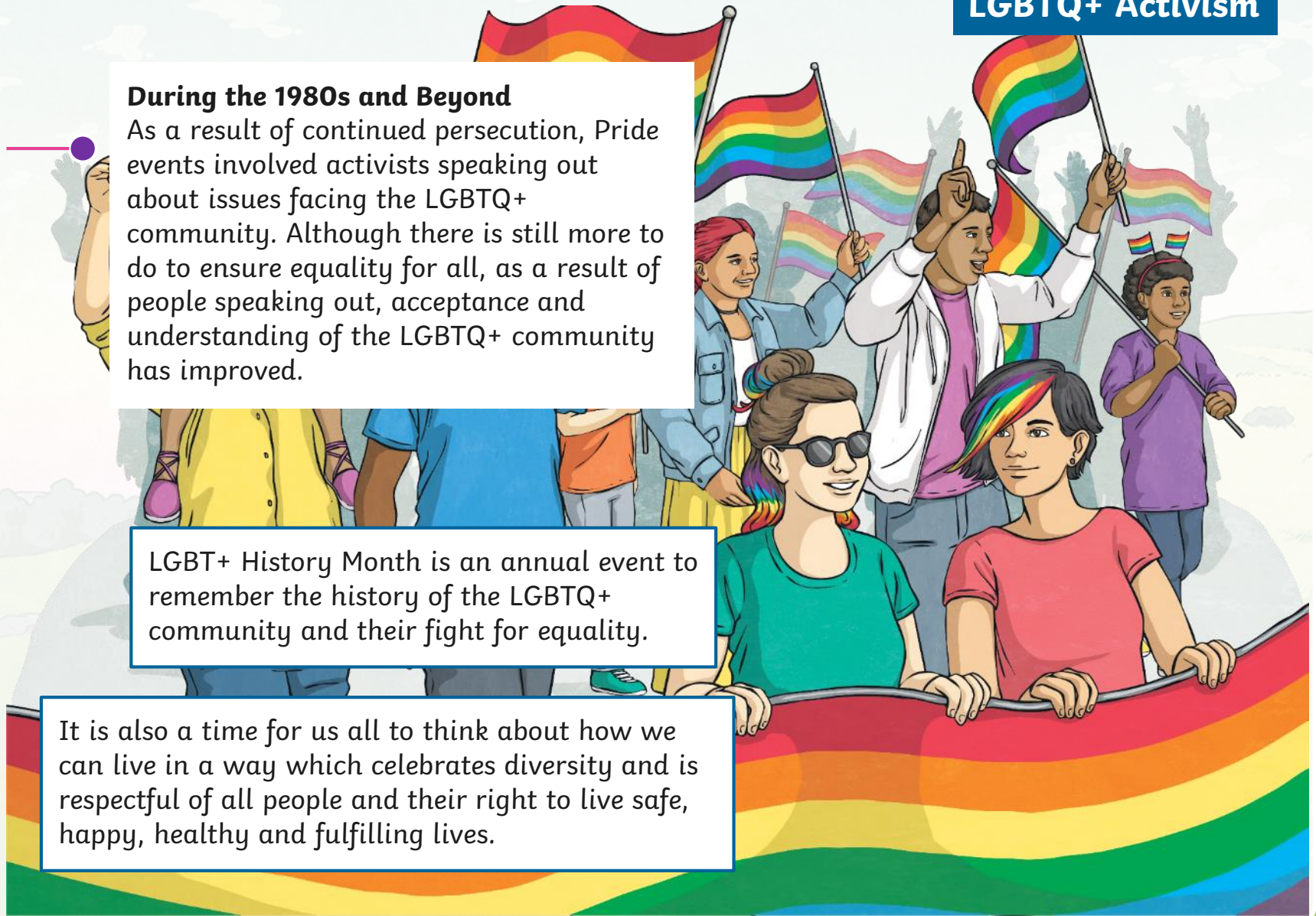
LGBTQ+ Activism

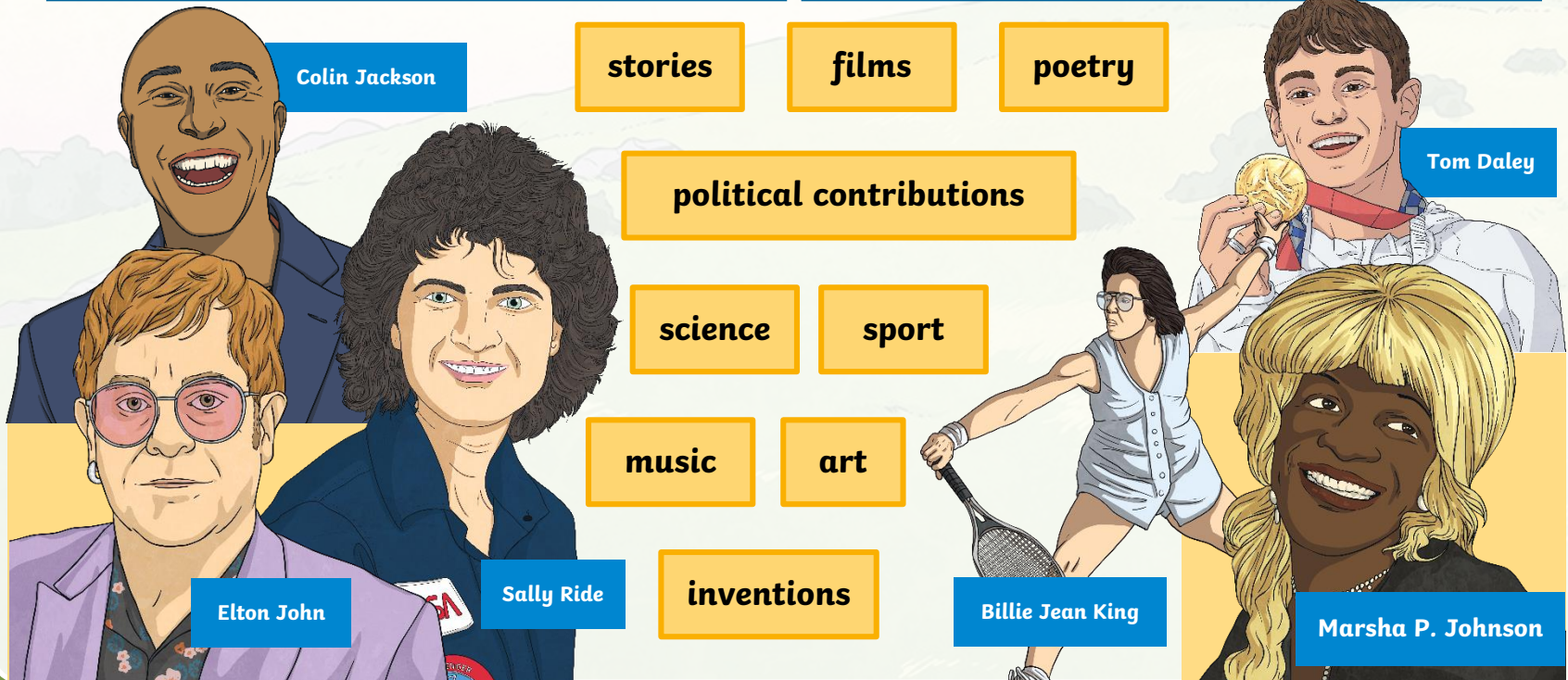
LGBT+ History Month is an annual event to remember the history of the LGBTQ+ community and their fight for equality.
