Internet Safety: Snap chat

Each newsletter, I will continue to include a top tips poster around an area of online safety. This month is an overview of what parents need to know about Snapchat which was requested by a parent. Please do let us know if there is a theme you would like me to source a guide for.

Your child's mental health and wellbeing: WhatsApp guide

WhatsApp age restriction is 13+

WhatsApp is a convenient and easy way to keep in touch with others. We know that connection to others is really important in terms of our wellbeing, however we need to be aware that there are also some risks to WhatsApp use, particularly for children and young people.

WhatsApp and emotional wellbeing

To start a chat on WhatsApp, all anyone needs is a person's phone number. If a child has given their number to someone else who then adds them to a group chat, everyone in this group chat will now have access to their number. This means that complete strangers can contact them.

Does your child know what to do if they get a message from someone they don't know?

Who is contacting me?

Be aware of chat lock. Chat lock is a feature which allows WhatsApp users to keep their chats in a separate locked folder, with its own secret code. This allows users to hide conversations, even if someone checks their phone and messages. This could include messages about harmful behaviours such as self-harm and inappropriate sexual content.

Secrecy and chat lock

WhatsApp has a feature which allows messages to be sent and only be viewed once. Unfortunately, this allows users to send inappropriate and abusive content which cannot be re-opened once seen. This means there is no evidence of what has been sent. It also means that if you check your child's phone you won't see a complete picture of what they have viewed.

You can never really know what has been sent or received by your child's account.

Disappearing content

Information sharing on WhatsApp can reach a lot of people, very quickly. This means that false information can rapidly gather momentum resulting in sharing of fake news. Children and young people may not have the critical thinking needed to understand what is real and what isn't. This also means that they may be vulnerable to scams. Internet Matters have produced a toolkit for parents and careers.

Scams and fakes

Teach them to be cautious

Guide them to ask themselves how likely a message from an unknown number is really from someone they know.

Adjust the settings

You can specify who can and cannot add them to group chats. You can do this in the 'Settings' menu under the 'Groups' tab.

Talk to them openly

Without judgment about what they are sharing and how they contribute. Consider with them how they can use group chats safely and that is okay to exit group chats if they feel uncomfortable.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Snapchat is a messaging app which allows users to send images, videos and texts to others. Its best-known feature is that anything sent 'disappears' 24 hours after it's been viewed; however, users are known to take screenshots or use another device to obtain a photo of their screen. In 2023, Snapchat added a chatbot function called 'My Al'.

ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

My AI is Snapchat's new chatbot, which replies to questions in a human-like manner. However, the software is still in its infancy and has significant drawbacks, such as biased, incorrect or misleading responses. There have already been numerous reports of young users turning to Al for medical help and diagnoses, which could be inaccurate and therefore potentially dangerous.

PREDATORS AND SCAMS

Predators can exploit Snapchat's disappearing messages by, for example, telling a user they have naked photos of them and will post them unless they're paid. Snapchat's own research found that 65% of teenagers had experienced this – on this app or others. This likely isn't helped by 'SnapMaps' – a feature which highlights your exact position in real-time. This is meant to help friends keep track of each other, but could be used for more sinister

MY EYES ONLY

Snapchat has a hidden photo vault called 'My Eves Only'. Teens can conceal sensitive photos and videos from parents and carers in this folde which is protected by a PIN. You can check for this by clicking on the icon which looks like two playing cards. This takes you to the 'Memories' folder which stores photos, stories and the My Eyes Only folder.

SCREEN TIME ADDICTION

Snapchat prioritises user engagement, with features like streaks (messaging the same person every day to build up a high score). The app also has sections called 'Discover' and 'Spotlight', which show tailored content to each user. However, this could also be seen as an attempt to hook users into watching videos endlessly. Furthermore, constant notifications can lure people into using the app.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Some content on Snapchat simply isn't suitable for children. The hashtags used to group content are determined by the poster, so even an innocent search term could still yield age-inappropriate results. The app's 'disappearing messages' feature also makes it easy for young people to share explicit images on impulse - so sexting continues to be a risk associated with Snapchat.

ONLINE PRESSURES

Although many of Snapchat's filters are designed to entertain or amuse, the 'beautify' effects on photos can set unrealistic body image expectations creating feelings of inadequacy in younger users Snapchat now also has 'priority' notifications (which still get displayed even if a device is in 'do not disturb' mode), increasing the pressure on users to log back in

Advice for Parents & Educators

UTILISE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Snapchat's 'Family Centre' lets you view the details of the child's account their friends list and who they've spoken to in the last week – and report any concerns. You must invite a child to the Family Centre for them to join. To keep the child's location hidden on the app, go into settings and turn on 'Ghost Mode' and Hide Live Location', and ensure they know not to share their location with anyone

BLOCK AND REPORT

If a stranger does connect with a child on Snapchat and begins to make them feel uncomfortable through bullying, pressure to send explicit images or by sending sexual images to them, the child can tap the three dots on that person's profile and report or block them. There are options to state why they're reporting that user – such as annoying or malicious messages, spam or

FAMILIARISE YOURSELF

Before you allow a child to download Snapchat, download it yourself and familiarise yourself with the app. Snapchat has produced a parents' guide to the app to help you understand how it works and any protections they have in place. A link for this can be found in the

ENCOURAGE OPEN DISCUSSIONS

Snapchat's risks can be easier to handle if you nurture an open dialogue. For example, discuss My AI's responses to questions and how reliable they are. 🔑 Talk about scams and blackmail before letting children sign up. If they're lured into a scam, encourage them to tell you immediately. Talk openly and non-judgementally about sexting, emphasising its inherent risks. Furthermore, explain how popular challenges' on the platform can have harmful consequences

Meet Our Expert

Dr Claire Sutherland is an online safety consultant, educator and researcher who has developed and implemented anti-bullying and cyber safety policies for schools. She has written various academic papers and carried out research for the Australian government comparing internet use and sexting behaviour of young people in the UK, USA and Australia.

Early Years

In Early Years, we have been exploring how different people celebrate important festivals and have learnt about Diwali, Hanukkah and the Christmas story. We are very excited as Christmas approaches and have been making cards and baubles with our year 6 buddies.

Our role play areas have been transformed into a Post Office and we have been writing Christmas cards and letters. We really enjoyed receiving our replies from Father Christmas!

We have enjoyed learning new Christmas songs with actions and have shown lots of courage to perform them to our families. We are now looking forward to our next learning experience based on Traditional Tales in the New Year and wish you all a Merry Christmas.











Year 1

In Year 1, we have continued to write sentences in our English lessons based on something that has happened in the books we are reading. We have been focusing on using the word 'and' in our sentences to connect two sentences together. In Maths we have been looking at 2D and 3D shapes. We have been naming them and

describing them using mathematical terminology. We have also been learning numbers to 20, both as a numeral and written as a word. In DT, the children have made and evaluated their playground



equipment. Many of the children were very impressed with how their model turned out and were proud of what they have done. Have a look at some of the completed models.

In Geography, we have been looking at maps of where we live and identify what is near to us. We have also looked at aerial photographs and described what we can see.

Thank you so much for your support in helping the children learn their lines and the songs for our Christmas show. We were so proud of how courageous they all were.

Over the last week, we have been enjoying taking part in some Christmas activities. We wish you all a Merry Christmas and look forward to seeing you in January.









Year 2

In Year 2 we have had a very busy few weeks! The children have finished off their learning about the Great Fire of London by writing their own fact files, using all of the information that they have learnt during this half term. They have applied all of their learning about how to write fabulous 'Year 2' style sentences and have made sure they included different sentence starters to make their writing even more interesting.

In maths, the children have been continuing with their learning about subtraction, where they have practised using dienes to support them with exchanging and regrouping when crossing a 10. After Christmas we will be moving on in maths to begin learning about shape.

The children were very excited to have a go at using the apparatus in PE this week, where they had the opportunity to practise their climbing skills using the wall bars. They also demonstrated all of the travelling and balancing skills they have learnt this half term by moving over and under different equipment.

In Art, the children enjoyed using charcoal and oil pastels to create some wonderful pictures, showing the wooden houses on fire during the Great Fire of London.

A focus for January will be reading; both aloud and reading comprehension. We would love to invite parents to volunteer to support with 1:1 reading at school. If you are interested and able to give up some time please contact the office.

We hope all of the children enjoy their festivities during the Christmas break and we look forward to seeing everyone back for more learning in January!


Year 3

Year 3 have continued to show what superstars they all are! In Maths, we have been continuing with our division and multiplication unit and in particular looking at the 3, 4 and 8 times tables. We have been using our knowledge of doubling and of the 4 times table to work out answers in the 8 times table. We have also been looking at related division sentences.

In English, we are publishing our newspaper reports about the discovery of Tutankhamun's tomb.

We were very excited to look at different sources in History to find out all about the discovery so that we could write our reports.

In Outdoor Learning, we had a fantastic Fabulous Finish when we made Egyptian flatbreads. Many of the children discovered that they rather liked dipping their flatbreads into the salsa! Thank you very much to the parents who came to help.



This week has been an exciting one for the children with the pantomime at the beginning of the week, which they thoroughly enjoyed and Christmas lunch on Wednesday. 




Year 4

Year 4 have had a busy term continuing our learning on the Romans, Anglo – Saxons and Vikings. We have looked at who they were and why they all wanted to come to Britain. We have taken all this research to enable us to write a non-chronological report all about the Romans, which shared in our fabulous finish gallery. We show cased our very own roman pots which we have designed and sculpted using different techniques to etch in our design. We also learnt how to use a slurry to help join two bits of clay together. Staying on theme, we learnt about roman numerals in maths. We took our learning outside and used natural materials to make numbers but not just any numbers... Roman numbers! We have really enjoyed having Coach Dave this term to teach us gymnastics and have also enjoyed learning the rules and techniques in dodgeball.

Year 5



The children have gained so much from our experience this term relating to World War 1. They have brought their knowledge and skills to research and analysing the conflict and some great writing (both fiction and non-fiction) has come from their learning.

As part of our fabulous finish, the children have painted pebbles and painted scenes from poppy fields of northern France. If your child has painted a pebble, can you encourage your child to hide it in your local community over the Christmas break? Each pebble will represent a soldier going out to war. We want the children to understand the anticipation of waiting to see if their 'soldier' will return.

In Design Technology, the children have been designing and making models of shelters, suitable for soldiers on the battlefield. We have looked at different types of joins to secure them.

Maths continues with fractions – in particular comparing fractions with different denominators. We have then been ordering the fractions by size and using these skills to answer word problems . We would encourage all children to continue with reading every

We would encourage all children to continue with reading every day for at least 20 minutes over the school holidays. In addition, please can you ensure you have their Rockstars login over Christmas, as learning about fractions is so much easier if you are secure in your multiplication tables.



That just leaves us to wish all our year 5 children and parents a Merry Christmas and peaceful New Year.



Year 6

Year 6 have completed many festive activities in the last couple of weeks. We looked at the history of the Christmas card and some traditional Victorian designs and completed our own in class. We also decorated our festive winter baubles - thank you to the PTA for providing these for our pupils.

In maths, we even completed some festive tasks relating to coordinates, translation and reflection.

In writing, we completed our Queen Victoria biographies in which we wrote about her early life, her catastrophic coronation ceremony, her wedding and other events that took place during her astonishing reign as monarch. In history we completed our end of topic post assessment notes and realised that we have learnt a lot about Victorian life. 159 Pupils bought nothing new in November




196 Pupils had a shower not a bath

School And Family Support Team (SAFS)

We are very proud of the support we offer to children and parents at school. Many needs are met through Quality First Teaching in class, but sometimes children need some additional support.

The SAFS team is a team of professionals who work within school. We meet together in school regularly. The team plan for children who need extra support. There are various needs such as social and emotional, cognition and learning difficulties like Dyslexia, speech and language difficulties, medical issues, English as an additional language, and behavioural needs. The SAFs team review support provided within school and when necessary, make referrals to outside agencies such as our school nurse or speech and language therapist.

If you have concerns about your child and would like some support then please speak to your class teacher in the first instance. They can then ask for advice from the SAFS team if needed. If teachers have concerns they will speak to you and also seek advice.
