What is the Autism in Schools Project?

It is a transformative programme across 27 schools in West Sussex

It is an exciting collaboration between WSCCs' Autism and Social Communication Team and their SEND Commissioning Team, the West Sussex Parent Carer Forum, ASPENS charity and the West Sussex SEND Youth Voice Forum.


The project's key aims include:

- Whole school cultural change to promote positive autism support and practice.
- Working directly with autistic children offering them the individual support they need.
- Working with the West Sussex Parent Carer Forum to build networks of support for families

Each school involved will have the opportunity work towards achieving a WSCC Autism Aware Award which is reaccredited every three years to ensure continual progress.



OAIP



The OAIP is a guide for schools and Early years settings developed by West Sussex County Council which outlines how they can meet the additional needs of most children and Young People.

Communication is Key

Fresh Start

- Many Parent Carers have negative experiences whilst their child is at school; they weren't believed when they first raised concerns, they were told their child was "fine" when they are at school, important information wasn't shared the list goes on.
- If it is possible, you should try and leave these problems behind to try and work with the school.
- It may be helpful to ask to discuss what has happened in the past so you can draw a line under it and the school can work to ensure these things don't happen in the future. You may wish to write an email always try to be clear, concise and professional.



Methods of communication

- Come to an arrangement with the school about the best way to communicate.
- Some schools have a simple document or flow chart clearly explaining who to communicate with and how.
- Make the school aware of your needs in terms of communication. Do you work and are not able to collect your child from school. Are you Neurodivergent yourself or is English an additional language.

Be Informed



- Read
- Talk to other parents who have already experienced what you are going through
- Attend Events
- Internet be careful there is a lot of fake and dangerous information

Plan for success – be proactive



Prioritise – What are the main things your child needs support with and what do you feel would make a difference to them – don't forget the four broad areas of SEND

Social, Emotional and Mental Health

Communication & Interaction

Cognition & Learning

Sensory or Physical Needs

A child's voice and a Parent's voice should be sought before the ILP is written. If you think it is due soon, ask to input.

Ask for a copy
Of the ILP or IEP
and any notes that
are made during
meetings.

Plan ahead - keep notes as things come up to help you think about what your child needs.

Pare

If you are unsure about anything, ask questions. Keep records this will help you to think about how to support your child and you can reflect on what has worked well and what hasn't.

If things aren't working well

- Ask for a meeting
- Keep lines of communication open
- Remain focused
- Seek Help
